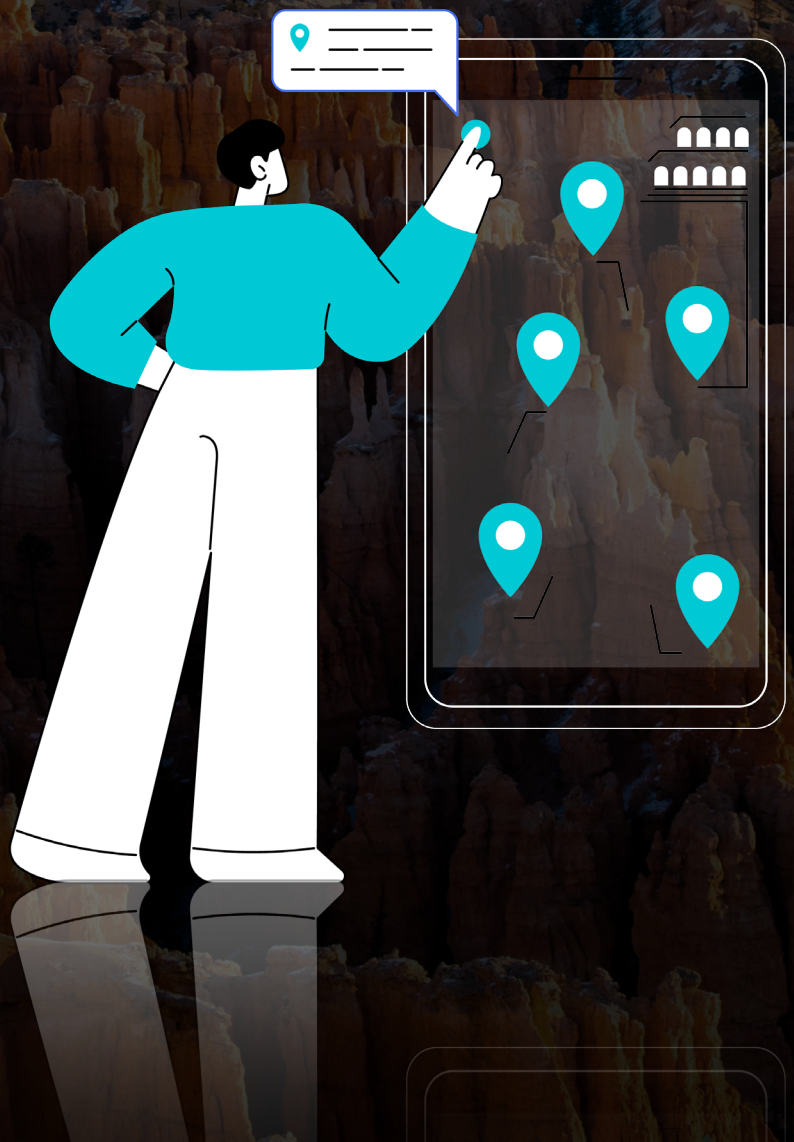

ITINERARIES

You can enjoy the park at your own pace with the self-guided audio tour from Action Tour Guide.

This flexible tour can be completed in one day or spread over multiple days. Since it is valid for one year and offers unlimited usage, you don't have to worry about seeing everything in one visit.

ONE-DAY ITINERARY:

- Start your day by entering Bryce Canyon National Park early in the morning. Be sure to download the app and tour in advance, as there is no cell signal within the park.
- Drive along the scenic route and stop at the must-see points (marked in the tour as "Must-See"):
 - Fairyland Point
 - Sunrise Point
 - Sunset Point
 - Bryce Point
 - Natural Bridge
 - Swamp Canyon Overlook
 - Farview Point
 - Ponderosa Canyon
 - Black Birch Canyon
 - Rainbow Point
- Plan a few short hikes along the viewpoints or trails, depending on your time and interest. (See the hikes section.)
- Enjoy a picnic lunch at one of the designated picnic areas within the park, like the areas near Sunset Point or Bryce Point. These spots offer beautiful surroundings to relax and recharge.
- As you head toward the park exit, wrap up your day with a stop at Bryce Point or Sunset Point to catch the sunset over the canyon. The view during the golden hour is breathtaking and the perfect way to end your day.

TWO-DAY ITINERARY:

- **Day 1:** Follow the one-day itinerary mentioned above. As mentioned there as well, please make sure you have the app and tour set up before you get to the entrance.
- **Day 1 Night:** Stay in the park after sunset to experience the night sky. Bryce Canyon National Park is renowned for its stargazing, with minimal light pollution and some of the darkest skies in the country. Ideal spots for stargazing include:
 - Sunset Point
 - Bryce Point
 - Natural Bridge
 - Rainbow Point
 - Farview Point
- **Day 2:** Return to the park to embark on hikes. (see Hikes section).
- After exploring, leave the park in the early afternoon and head towards Jackson or Teton Village.
- After finishing your Bryce Canyon National Park tour, consider exploring nearby destinations with our self-guided tours.
 - Heading west? Visit [Zion National Park](#) for impressive sandstone cliffs, deep canyons, and scenic trails through lush river valleys.
 - Travelling northeast? Discover [Capitol Reef National Park](#), where you can experience unique rock formations, historic sites, and scenic drives through the Waterpocket Fold.
 - Looking for more adventure nearby? [Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument](#) offers rugged landscapes, slot canyons, and striking desert scenery that showcase Utah's natural beauty.

WHERE TO STAY



BRYCE CANYON CITY

The closest town to Bryce Canyon National Park's entrance, Bryce Canyon City provides a range of accommodations, dining options, and visitor amenities, making it a popular base for park visitors.

PANGUITCH

A bit further from the park, Panguitch is known for its historic small-town vibe. It offers a range of accommodations, including motels and inns, along with local restaurants and shops.

TROPIC

Just a short drive from Bryce Canyon, Tropic offers a mix of inns, bed-and-breakfasts, and vacation rentals. It has a charming, rural feel with a few restaurants and essential services.

CANNONVILLE

Situated along Scenic Byway 12, Cannonville is a quieter option with limited lodging and dining options, ideal for travellers seeking a peaceful setting close to Bryce Canyon and Kodachrome Basin State Park.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO



ENTRANCE FEES: Requires a park pass, which is not included in the self-guided tour. [Review pass options.](#)



RESERVATION: Required in most campgrounds, which is not included in the self-guided tour. [Reserve here before your trip.](#)



OPERATING HOURS: Open 24 Hours. Year-Round. Partial closures or limited accessibility in winter due to snow. [Learn more before you go.](#)



ROAD CLOSURES: Unexpected weather or construction incidents can affect roads. While the tour is updated frequently to include detours, it cannot reflect up-to-the-minute updates. [Check before you leave.](#)
